of the churches in the South Central Conference. Therefore, the South Central Conference Church Ministries & Mission Development Department exists to assist pastors and their church leaders in leading their churches to become more Spirit-led and Mission-driven. We do this by providing pastors and their church leaders with ministry coaching and support in five fundamental areas of Church Development: 1) **Prayer**, 2) **Mission**, 3) **Spiritual Gifts**, 4) **Small Groups**, and 5) **Ministries**. When engaged sequentially, these become one fivefold strategy for leading churches to become more Spirit-led and Mission-driven.

SPIRIT-LED, MISSION-DRIVEN PROCESS STEPS #7 & 8 first ministry in response to a mis-

Our SCC Vision for the next five years is focused on four major emphases: #1 Transformational Evangelism; #2 Christian Education; #3 Community Engagement; and #4 Youth & Young Adult Empowerment. The Church Ministries & Mission Development Department has been tasked with assisting pastors and their church leaders in moving their churches forward with #1 Transformational Evangelism and #3 Community Engagement. To do so, we recommend churches follow our 10-Step *Spirit-Led, Mission-Driven Process.* In previous editions we have presented the following steps: 1) Discover the Mission, 2) Describe the Vision, 3) Depend on God's Promise, 4) Draw a Fresh Slate, 5) Design Mission Strategy, and 6) Develop Ministries. This



month we move on to **Step #7 and Step #8: Detail Ministry Descriptions and Deploy Members.**

In last month's edition (September 2023), as we focused on *Step #6: Develop Ministries*, we saw that the New Testament Church developed its first ministry in response to a mission-related need: "The Greek-speaking believers complained about the Hebrew-speaking believers, saying that their widows were being discriminated against in the daily distribution of food. So, the Twelve called a meeting of all the believers. They said, 'We apostles should spend our time teaching the word of God, not running a food program. And so, brothers, select seven men who are well respected and are full of the Spirit and wisdom. We will give them this responsibility. Then we apostles can spend our time in prayer and teaching the word.' Everyone liked this idea, and they chose the following: Stephen (a man full of faith and the Holy Spirit), Philip, Procorus, Nicanor, Timon, Parmenas, and Nicolas of Antioch (an earlier convert to the

Jewish faith). These seven were presented to the apostles, who prayed for them as they laid their hands on them. So, God's message continued to spread. The number of believers greatly increased in Jerusalem, and many of the Jewish priests were converted, too." (Acts 6:1–7, NLT).

The story in Acts 6, however, doesn't just reveal why the New Testament Church developed its first ministry, it also details how they went about doing it. First, the leaders detailed the exact ministry that needed to be created, outlining its purpose and detailing its parameters the ministry task would be food distribution; the ministry target, the widows; and the ministry mission, to ensure all were equitably served while enabling the apostles to focus primarily on the ministry of prayer and the word. Second, a description was given regarding the kind of people that were needed to serve in this particular ministry-respected men who were full of the Holy Spirit and wisdom. And third, individuals were selected to serve.

We should take note of their sequence. Essentially, the apostles crafted a "ministry job description," complete with requisite skills and expertise, and then, only after all were clear on what needed to be done, and exactly what kind of people were needed to do it, were individuals selected to serve in ministry. Operating according to this progression during a nominating committee process would both help to ensure that people are placed in ministry according to their spiritual gifts and enable those selected to serve to better understand exactly what they are being asked to do.

MEN'S MINISTRIES

Connection

Here the sense of closeness and belongingness a person can experience when having supportive relationships with those around them.

Connection is when two or more people interact with each other and each person feels valued, seen, and heard. There's no judgment, and you feel stronger and nourished after engaging with them.

Human connection can be a chat over lunch with a friend, a hug from a spouse after a long day, or a hike in the woods with a family member.

Connecting with someone doesn't have to always include words, either. Time spent in relative closeness and experience can also be a bonding experience.¹

In this life, in the present and even in the past, there has always been a need for connection even among men. Connection is a way for you not to feel lonely in a crowded world, a world where "I can do it all by myself" or "I don't need any help." The fact is that at some point during the day-to-day journey of our lives we all need someone to connect with.

We were made for connection. Community was intended for humanity right from the start. When we look back at creation, God said it was not good for man to be alone and thus created woman. And in that connection, there was compassion and there was love in the marriage relationship, but that is not the type of relationship I am speaking of.

What I am speaking of is a connection between man to man, buddy to buddy, homie to homie. Even though your spouse can connect with you on various levels and provide support in multiple situations, both men and women need someone of the same gender to connect to.

Why, you may ask? The reason is there are certain experiences in life each gender will understand about each other without having to explain. In other words, you have that person you can call, text and they automatically understand. It is in community and connection that you can deal with the hard questions of life.

Men, we cannot do it by ourselves and no matter how strong we are, no matter how great we feel, we need somebody to connect with. At church we need someone to connect with. Also, this connection with other men will assist and keep you from making the wrong type of connection with the wrong individuals.

One of the greatest ways that I have discovered to connect is through small groups. Small groups provide connection and accountability, and they help you deal with the feelings of loneliness that are part of living in this broken world.

I end with this quote from John Schroeder in his article on ministrymatters.com:

To build a men's group takes faith and a partnership with God. It is an opportunity to Change lives within and outside your congregation. It takes time, patience, prayer, and people working together in order to construct programs that benefit men and their families. It is an exciting opportunity because as you begin, you have no idea what great accomplishments will result from everyone's efforts².

"Ask, then; ask, and ye shall receive. Ask for humility, wisdom,



bout seven years ago, the Holy Spirit inspired us to no longer present health solely within the confines of our Seventh-day Adventist churches, but to take it outside to the community! Due to this shift in our ministry, an additional name expansion was necessary...Health Evangelism Ministries.

God has truly blessed our registration attendance with anywhere between 50 to as high as 140 in community venues (hotel conference rooms, auditoriums, convention centers etc.) in cities across this conference. However, of the last eleven health conferences presented, our most recent one truly tested our faith!

At this particular Healthy Heart Conference, registration was live, advertisements were placed on social media, banners were sent, and registration remained at completely zero for a solid month! In fact, one week before our weekend date, I told my wife don't deposit the advance

travel check we received from the conference, we may just return it! Moreover, even the personnel at AdventSource who have managed our registration over the years called wondering why nobody had registered and if we were going to postpone the conference until another time.

However, after hearing our pastor, William Lee, during Wednesday night prayer meeting talk about "Faith Over Fear," coupled with hearing Pastor Furman Fordham's prayer for our weekend success during a zoom meeting, we decided to "Ride by Faith" and make the six-hour trip without having anybody registered!

Fast forward, on Sabbath afternoon, the day of our conference at the Foley, AL Civic Center, nearly forty (40) attendees were present, some driving from over 30 miles away! In fact, one community person arrived 1 1/2 hours early! Bible studies were distributed, and lives were transformed! On Sunday, day-two, the conference transitioned to the local host SDA church, and even more from the community were in attendance, giving us the opportunity to actually walk all attendees through a bible study on healthful living! Precious contacts were made, and lives were changed for eternity!

As CeCe Winans sings, …" I love you Lord, for Your mercy never fails me, all my days I've been held in Your hands, from the moment that I wake up, until I lay my head, Oh I will sing of the goodness of God. Cause all my life You have been faithful, and all my life You have been so, so good…"











Curtis and Paula Eakins Health Evangelism Ministry Leaders



n June 2017, one month after I was installed as the pastor of the Orchard Park Church in Chattanooga TN, I talked to the congregation about pursuing social justice in the community around our church in response to the acquittal of the police officer who killed Philando Castile. I explained to them that I was going to be a pastor who was heavily involved in the community working for social change. I explained that it is the responsibility of the church to also work in the community for social change. Since that time, we decided to engage our mission field as both salt and light, permeating society as agents of redemption. As salt, we have set a goal in our congregation to become so embedded in the community that there is nothing that happens in this city that we do not have direct or indirect influence over. We said that to obtain that kind of influence, our members must engage the community by joining nonprofit boards, volunteering with various agencies, joining various organizations, attending public meetings and participating in the political processes when appropriate. As light, we are intentionally spreading the gospel through preaching, engaging in one-on-one and group Bible studWe decided to engage our mission field as both salt and light, permeating society as agents of redemption.

ies, public evangelism, and running a quality church school.

Since that time, we've participated with Pastor Fordham and the Church Ministries and Mission Development Team to restructure our congregation's ministry delivery system so that we can involve every member, fulfill our mission more effectively, and realize our God-given vision. A team of our young adult leaders met several times with Pastor Fordham to affirm our core values and mission, learn and understand how to implement the Spirit-led, Mission-driven process for ministry delivery, and to create ministries that would facil-

itate our mission and vision. After our meetings with Pastor Fordham, a team of our leaders met to strategize about the most effective and simple ways to get every member involved in ministry according to their spiritual gifts. We designed a ministry delivery system that combines the old church election cycle for choosing officers with the Spirit-led, Mission-driven model. In short, we created a ministry delivery system that has four areas for member involvement at three levels. The areas of involvement are Serve, Lead, Grow, and Support. The three levels are L1 – short-term ministry initiatives, L2 – traditionally elected church officers, and L3 – paid church workers.

The ministry areas represent our disciple-making process. Serve is a connection point between the church and community. It is the ministry area where it's easiest to be involved. Ministries in this area should primarily be designed to connect with people in our community and congregation though relief and human development type ministries. Lead is a connection point for corporate experiences with God. It is the ministry area where most people are involved. Ministries in this area should primarily be designed to connect people to Christ through our worship and prayer services, and Bible studies. Grow is a connection point for small group experiences with God. It is the ministry area where fellowship is involved. Ministries in this area should primarily be designed to connect individuals with people who wish to become mature disciples of Jesus Christ through small groups. Ministries in the Support area are designed to steward the day-to-day operations of the church, and to facilitate quality outreach and worship experiences. This ministry area consists of the church board, ministry placement team, finance team, and other leadership teams and committees.

Members of the congregation serve in the ministry areas at three levels. Level 1 ministries are led by members interested in short-term ministry initiatives. Level 2 ministries are led by members serving in traditional elected church ministries. Level 3 ministries are led by members who are serving as paid church workers. Members working in the Serve and Grow ministry areas can do so on all three ministry levels. The Lead and Support ministry areas are only for Levels 2 and 3 ministries.

In our new ministry delivery system, we still hold regular church elections on a two-year cycle. During the election, we vote for traditional (and some nontraditional) church offices that serve our context. These elected offices are Level 2 ministries. We vote for people to serve on our Ministry Placement Team, also. The Ministry Placement Team has the responsibility and authority to put members into ministry at L1 at any time of the year, and at L2 as recommendations to the church board between election cycles. The church board puts members into ministry at L3 (the church votes the paid position in business session, the board hires the person).

Here is the reality: We already operated in ministry with short-term ministry initiatives and paid workers. Our ministry delivery system has formalized what was informal. For some members our reimagined ministry delivery system is strange and uncomfortable. Here is another reality: "Christian churches are experiencing an erosion of confidence on the part of secular society that has diminished their credibility as the repository of moral authority and the model of moral leadership." We have to regain that confidence. The only way to do it is, "to kill what makes us comfortable, in order to invest in what makes God known and changes lives." Our reimagined ministry delivery system may be uncomfortable, but it is also an investment in what makes God known and changes lives.
