e believe that the South Central Conference Office exists to strengthen and support the mission and ministry of the churches in the South Central Conference. Therefore, the South Central Conference Church Ministries & Mission Development Department exists to assist pastors and their church leaders in leading their churches to become more Spirit-led and Mission-driven. We do this by providing pastors and their church leaders with ministry coaching and support in five fundamental areas of Church Development: 1) Prayer, 2) Mission, 3) Spiritual Gifts, 4) Small Groups, and 5) Ministries. When engaged sequentially, these become one fivefold strategy for leading churches to become more Spirit-led and Mission-driven.

10-STEP SPIRIT-LED, MISSION-DRIVEN PROCESS

ur SCC Vision for the next five years is focused on four major emphases: #1 Transformational Evangelism; #2 Christian Education; #3 Community Engagement; and #4 Youth & Young Adult Empowerment. The Church Ministries & Mission Development Department has been tasked with assisting pastors and their church leaders in moving their churches forward with #1 Transformational Evangelism and #3 Community Engagement. To do so, we recommend churches follow our 10-Step Spirit-Led, Mission-Driven Process. In our previous edition we introduced Step #1: Discover the Mission. This month we move on to Step #2: Describe the Vision.

When things got tough a few weeks ago during Super Bowl LVII in Glendale, Arizona, Kansas City Chiefs quarterback Patrick Mahomes was motivated to play through the pain of a high-anlke sprain—not because his mission was simply to win a football game, but because his vision was to hoist the Lombardi trophy, and be crowned Super Bowl Champ!

In his bestselling book Start with Why: How Great Leaders Inspire Everyone to Take Action, Simon Sinek suggests that people are motivated most, not by "what" they do—the mission, but by "why" they do it—the vision. This means as leaders, if we desire to motivate the masses, we must move from the informative step of clarifying mission to the inspiring step of casting vision.

Casting vision is about painting a picture of our preferred future. It's describing the dream that we want to become reality. And it is this

dream, this vision—especially during times of challenge and trial—that galvanizes and energizes peolple to continue moving forward with the mission.

Jesus understood this. That's why immediately after He rearticulated the mission and began His ascent Continued on page 2

back to heaven, two men in white apparel, presumably angels, said to the disciples: "Men of Galilee, why do you stand gazing up into heaven? This same Jesus, who was taken up from you into heaven, will so come in like manner as you saw Him go into heaven" (Acts 1:11). Jesus had sent them to describe the vision. He sent them to give the disciples their "why."

Frequently, when churches today speak about their vision, reference is made to a strategic plan with short, medium, and long-range goals. It

may include something like launching a community mentoring program within the next year; baptizing 100 people within the next three years; increasing giving by 100% within the next five years; and breaking ground on a new worship facility within the next seven years. However, as admirable and appropriate as plans such as these may be, they should never be confused with the ultimate vision Jesus gave to His church.

Executing the mission of making disciples who make disciples results in a Christian church; but doing it

to prepare people for Jesus's soon return results in an Adventist movement. Having family and friends to join us in saying, "Lo, this is our God, we have waited for Him and He has come to save us," and hearing Him reply, "Well done thou good and faithful servant, enter into the joy of your Lord" will be our "Super Bowl victory!"

Describe this vision and God will create Holy Spirit-inspired momentum within His church!

The Small Group Equals Safety

e are already in March, and you may wonder what I will do with the men at my church to impact the community or city we are in. The first and most important component is prayer. Secondly, establish small groups. Why you may ask? Most men do not like to share information about themselves unless it has a purpose, or they feel as if trust has been built within the group. So, for these men, a small group equals a "Safe Space" with safe people that they can trust.

For too many of our men, church is a place with surface relationships that do not go beyond a casual nod or handshake. And during the week, when they experience trials and challenges, they are lonely and detatched. However, small groups can deepen relationships and provide men with much needed support, lessening the feeling of loneliness and isolation.

You might say that we only have 3 men at our church, but that is a great place to start. There doesn't need to be more than 3 men in a group. The important thing is to stress to each member of the group the importance of trust and accountability. Building this first group will establish a good foundation for future groups.

These men now have the confidence to start their own small groups. This will happen just because you stepped out as the Pastor or Men's Ministry leader and started a small group at your church.

I, along with the South Central Conference Men's Ministry team, will be working on a small group training schedule. Be on the lookout for this valuable information. Please remember our focus is small groups equal a "Safe Space" for trust and accountability to grow.

Three is a Charm

ave you ever wondered why the number 3 is so powerful throughout scripture? For example, God is God the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. God is also omniscient, omnipotent and omnipresent.


Addition by Subtraction at South Nashville

Spirit-led, Mission-driven (SLMD) church's congregation is designed around a straightforward and strategic process that moves through the stages of spiritual growth. SLMD is a new design for church ministry. The South Nashville Seventh Day Adventist (SNSDA) church believed that the SLMD process would significantly make a difference in our discipleship process. For years, SNSDA did not grow as projected, and minimal numbers of people came to know Christ. Ironically, this was not due to a lack of knowledge about Christ but the complexity of our church's current focus and process for ministry. Research indicated that complex churches were struggling. SNSDA was a complex church. Our desire for reorganization allowed us to see one of the most powerful paths to progress: subtraction. Quoting engineer Leidy Klotz, "Sometimes the best way forward involves removing, streamlining, and simplifying things."

The intriguing part of looking at a new church design is that you would be motivated to add and not subtract, but the Spirit led us to do exactly that: subtract. An addition ends with something to display. Subtraction ends with removing something until there is nothing physical or tangible to show later on. There is general agreement that while the concept is powerful, subtraction takes work to put into effect. Subtraction was hard to digest and tougher to share with board members and the church body. The Ministry Placement Team (created to jump-start the SLMD process) along with the pastor agreed to pray daily for the Holy Spirit and follow the guidance of the Chuch Ministries & Mission Development Team at the SCC Conference to face the hurdles met when subtracting.

In 1 Corinthians 3, believers are





called God's children (v.1), God's field (v. 9), and God's building (v. 9). We are God's children. We begin as spiritual babies because we are born again (John 3:3). That process is critical. Just as babies need the right environment to grow physically, people need the right environment to grow spiritually. In simple terms, SNSDA church leaders and members must be able to provide a clearly defined process of how someone moves from being a new Christian to becoming a mature follower of Christ. A clearly defined process encourages people to progress through it because they know the expectation. The people (members and leaders) within any organization must know the process because they are integral to fulfilling it. This concept birthed our "Love God, Love the Church, Love the City, and Resource Ministries." (See organizational chart.)

Transformation Process/ The How: Love God, Love the Church, Love the City.

The organizational chart illustrates the HOW of the SLMD process. Imagine a guest coming to our church wanting to become a member. The guest would first encounter our Love God Ministry which exists to lead people to connect with Jesus through prayer, worship, and Bible Study. Then, to strengthen their relationship with God by connecting with others, he or she would participate in our Love the Church Ministry. Through their connection with God and a need to serve the people in practical ways, he or she would participate in our Love the City Ministry.

The Spirit-led, Mission-driven process is designed to partner with God and move people through the stages of spiritual growth. SNSDA believes this transformation process creates an environment that promotes clarity, unity, and a demonstrated sense of spiritual growth. We understand that people are at different places in their spiritual journey. The process flows logically and is applied to each ministry in the church. The church abandons everything that is not in the process.

Does this all resonate in your church too? Do you see how subtraction can have a greater impact than addition? If so, we encourage you to become an SCC Spirit-led, mission-driven church too!
